### Open days and volunteering sessions

### Dear Friends

Spring is here and there is much to progress report in the gardens. We have been busy over the closed season with some organisational developments and major works in the gardens.

### Charitable Incorporated Organisation

In November we became a registered charity, as agreed at the AGM last year. Benefits include greater opportunities for securing project funding, favourable VAT rates and maximising donations through Gift Aid.

### Composting Toilet

We are currently installing a disabled access composting toilet (with sedum roof) behind the north wall. Thanks to our local councillors whose generous donation provided us with a substantial grant for this project.



### Electricity and water

We now have an electricity supply to the Gazebo, the south end of the walled garden for events, and the undercroft. At the same time as we dug the trenches for electricity we took the opportunity of installing water pipes around the walled garden. The gardens have taken a battering – but they will recover!

### Trustee and volunteer hours

In 2015 over 3,000 hours was spent by the trustees, volunteers and community groups either gardening, greeting visitors, events, funding bids and a range of policies, management plans and other essential (but not always exciting) paperwork. Huge thanks to everyone who supported Old Durham Gardens with their time last year.

### Monthly visitor numbers

In 2015 we had 646 visitors who signed our visitor record, an increase of 150 from 2014. Many visitors walk through the lower gardens throughout the year so the total number of people who benefit from the work of the volunteers is far greater.

### Music in the Gardens 2015



Over 400 people came to the gardens in September to enjoy the music, the company, the food and drink and the beauty of the walled garden.

### Donations

We have been grateful for a number of donations last year towards the cost of plants and other gardening essentials. Together with membership subscriptions these donations, irrespective of size, are very much appreciated and help us to continue to maintain and develop the gardens.

### Funding the work of the gardens

Finance is always a challenge and we thank all Friends, Durham County Council, visitors, donors and grant awarding bodies for their continued support. We were successful in obtaining funds from the Durham Area Action Partnership (AAP) local councillors Neighbourhood Budget, Area Budget and County Durham Community Foundation Small Grants Budget. We also received funding from the Royal Horticultural Society's It's Your Neighbourhood Fund plus the National Lottery Awards4ALL process. We will keep applying for funding to continue with the plans to improve the gardens.

- Planting the parterre channels
- Planting the terrace border
- Pruning and shaping the pyramidal yews
- Cutting and shaping hedges
- Updating the website
- Publishing Old Durham Garden guides
- Working with community groups
- Exploring more open events
- Collecting memories of the gardens
- Enjoying the blossom . . . and pruning all 27 espalier fruit trees in the walled garden
